RADIOGRAPHS (X-RAYS)

- Decay in both baby (deciduous) and second (permanent) teeth should be identified as soon as possible.
- Sometimes decay cannot be seen with the naked eye, especially if it is forming between the teeth.
- X-rays help the dental therapist/oral health therapist to find dental caries (holes/decay).
- X-rays give a detailed picture of the patient's teeth, including the roots and surrounding bone.
- A baseline x-ray is taken and can be compared to follow-up x-rays.
- Sometimes the dental therapist/oral health therapist may refer the patient to the Dental Department at Whanganui Hospital for a more extensive type of x-ray.
